- #26-212 Equitable Recess Opportunities for Upper Schools - Vice Chair Dube, Member de Paula Santos, and Member Jaikumar**

WHEREAS: Cambridge Public Schools policy states that K–8 students will have daily recess periods with opportunities for active play; and

WHEREAS: Recess provides students with important opportunities for physical activity, social connection, unstructured play, and a break from the academic demands of the school day; and

WHEREAS: The quality of a student's recess experience depends not only on the amount of time provided, but also on access to appropriate spaces, equipment, activities, and opportunities for both active and less-active recreation; and

WHEREAS: Recess environments and opportunities currently vary substantially among Cambridge's upper schools, with students at some schools having access to playgrounds, fields, recreational equipment, games, and multiple activity choices, while students at other schools have significantly fewer options; and

WHEREAS: These differences can result from building and site design, shared-campus arrangements, rules governing the use of existing outdoor spaces, available equipment, staffing, or other operational considerations; and

WHEREAS: A student's access to meaningful opportunities for movement, play, social connection, and restoration during the school day should not depend on which Cambridge upper school they attend; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the Superintendent conduct a review of recess opportunities at each Cambridge upper school across the fall and early winter months of December and January and report to the School Committee on the following:

- The amount of recess time provided to students at each school

- The indoor and outdoor spaces available to students during recess, including any spaces located on school campuses that students are not currently permitted to use and the reasons for those restrictions
- The equipment and structured or unstructured recreational opportunities available to students at each school
- Staffing coverage for recess periods at each school
- Any significant disparities among schools in students' access to physical activity, play, and recreational choices during recess
- Practical steps that could be taken during the 2026–2027 school year to provide a more equitable range of recess opportunities across the upper schools, including changes to space-use rules, increased access to existing facilities, the purchase of recreational equipment, programming, or other relatively low-cost improvements; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the Superintendent develop recommended minimum expectations for the quality of the recess experience at Cambridge upper schools so that all students have access to meaningful choices for movement, play, social interaction, and restoration, regardless of the physical campus they attend; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the findings and recommendations be presented to the School Committee in February 2027.

#26-213 Superintendent Evaluation – Chair Weinstein, Vice Chair Dube and Mayor Siddiqui

WHEREAS: Massachusetts law mandates that School Committees implement a rigorous and comprehensive evaluation process for all educators, including Superintendents (603 CMR 35.00); and

WHEREAS: In Cambridge, the Superintendent's employment agreement stipulates that "the Superintendent shall be evaluated annually by the Committee" and that "The Committee and the Superintendent shall agree upon a time in each year...to conduct the Superintendent's evaluation" (Section 7(B), "Employment Agreement Between The Cambridge Public Schools And David Murphy 2025-2029"); and

WHEREAS: The Superintendent has not yet received an evaluation during the 2026-27 school year; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the School Committee conduct a summative evaluation no later than June 30, 2027.

#26-214 RSTA Data Review – Member Harding

WHEREAS: The Rindge School of Technical Arts (RSTA) is committed to providing students with high-quality technical education that connects classroom learning with workplace applications and prepares students for employment, further education, training, and other postsecondary pathways; and

WHEREAS: It is important to periodically assess RSTA programs to identify strengths, gaps, and opportunities for improvement and ensure students have the resources and supports necessary for success; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That the Superintendent and his team conducts a comprehensive review of RSTA and its programs, to assess how effectively programs attract, retain, and prepare students for successful postsecondary pathways; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the review examine, among other areas, staffing and instructors, curriculum and materials, equipment and facilities, funding, advising, work-based learning opportunities, industry credentials, and other supports available to students; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the review include data from the five most recent school years and recommendations to ensure students graduate with the knowledge, technical skills, credentials, and career-readiness skills needed to successfully pursue employment, further education or training, or other postsecondary pathways; and be it further

RESOLVED: That the findings, data, and recommendations be presented at a Regular Meeting of the School Committee no later than March 31, 2027.

#26-215 — Decision and Vote on Spring Street Future Programming — Member Hudson, Member Harding and Member Jaikumar

On August 4, 2026, the School Committee adopted Motion #26-177, requesting that families receive by September 4 a specific timeline for resolving future programming at 158 Spring Street, including the date on which a formal recommendation would be brought to the School Committee for a vote.

The Superintendent and staff have undertaken substantial analysis and public engagement regarding the programming options for the building. However, the Committee has not placed discussion of or deliberation on those options, nor a vote to confirm final programming, on a School Committee agenda - and no expected date for those Committee actions has been communicated to the full Committee or to the public.

The Cambridge Preschool Program lottery opens October 1. Families should not be required to enter the lottery without knowing the full set of options that may be available to them. Questions concerning construction, occupancy, and implementation remain, but those questions should be addressed as part of the Committee's decision and should not continue to delay it.

The School Committee therefore orders that:

1. The School Committee shall deliberate and schedule a vote on a final programming decision for 158 Spring Street no later than October 15, 2026.
2. The Superintendent shall address any construction, occupancy, or implementation contingencies no later than October 15, 2026.
3. Once the vote date has been established, the Superintendent shall communicate that date within five business days to all CPS families and prospective families for the 2027–2028 school year.
